NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

The Federal Council has appointed Dr. Eric Kessler, at present Press Counsellor at the Swiss Legation in

Washington, to the post of Chargé d'Affaires in

Dr. Kessler was born in 1897 in Winterthur, he studied at the Universities of Zurich, Geneva, Paris, Berlin and Göttingen. He started his career as a Journalist in 1924. From 1929-1939 Dr. Kessler was London correspondent of the "Neue Zürcher Zeitung." At the outbreak of the last war, in 1939, he was appointed Press Attaché at the Swiss Legation in London and in 1946, he was transferred to the Swiss Legation in Washington with the rank of Counsellor of Legation.

Customs receipts during the month of October totalled 62.8 million francs or 15.4 million francs more than during the same period in 1949.

During the first 10 months of the current year customs receipts amounted to 482.8 million francs. (Same period 1949: 398.8 million francs).

Following the decision of the Swiss National Council to adhere to the European Payments Union, Mr. P. Rossy, Vice Governor of the Swiss National Bank, has been elected a member of the Managing-Board of the E.P.U.

The Norwegian Foreign Minister, M. Halvard Lange, was received in audience by M. Max Petitpierre, President of the Swiss Confederation; he was later on the guest of the Swiss Government at a luncheon.

The Federal Council has declared that it will subsidise air raid shelters incorporated in new building projects.

The tribunal of Lucerne has recently Cantonal passed sentence of five months imprisonment on a motorist who, under the influence of alcohol ran over a cyclist who succumbed to his injuries. Two other motorists were also

sentenced to six weeks imprisonment for driving when drunk [A.T.S.]

The Technical University of Karlsruhe has honoured Dr. John Eggert, Professor at the Federal Institute of Technology (ETH) in Zurich, with the degree of doctor honoris causa.]A.T.S.[

Wireless operator Jules Gloor, a member of the personnel of "Swissair" for the last twenty years, has flown three million kilometers. [A.T.S.]

Winter sports enthusiasts throughout the world will be delighted to learn that negotiations have now been completed for the opening of the Cresta Run at St. Moritz. Lord Brabazon of Tara, whose riding is classical and whose knowledge and experience of the run are unique, acting with the Swiss authorities, has carried out the arrangements and the celebrated "piste" will be open from January 6th to February 10th from Junction.

It is proposed in this short season to hold races for all the famous trophies. It will be a very full programme, requiring the blessings of the weather gods and — may we hope — some easing of the currency restrictions.

Dr. Paul Ruegger, President of the International Red Cross Committee, accompanied by two other members of the committee and three of the staff, has left Geneva for Moscow by air. This will be the first personal contact made with the U.S.S.R. alliance of crosses and crescents and much importance is ascribed to it in Red Cross circles.

Construction of a passenger aerial cableway Stalden to Staldenried (Valais) has been completed. Starting from the railway station at Stalden on the Brig-Visp-Zermatt railway, it passes over the deep gorge of the Visp and ascends to the village of Stalden-A second section is under construction from Zur Tannen to Gspon.

The Swiss Alpine Club has voted 45,000 francs towards the cost of rebuilding the Tschierva hut which stands at a height of 8,070ft, on the moraine of the Tschierva glacier in the Engadine. The glacier has receded so much during the past two years that the moraine, no longer supported by the mass of ice, is crumbling. Last spring the terrace collapsed and the hut was closed. A new hut will be erected on rock at a cost of 80,000 francs.

The Swiss wholesale prices index rose to 224 at the end of September in the series based on the average for July, 1914, equalling 100 and to 208.5 in the series August 1939—100. This represented an advance of 1.9 per cent. on the end-of-August figures of 219.9 and 204.8 respectively.

A Swiss firm has produced a new kind of paper, which resists tearing when wet.


The International Time Table Conference which took place this year in Amsterdam from the 11th to the 21st October, under the chairmanship of the Swiss Federal Railways, has succeeded in reducing the running time of the Simplon Orient Express between Paris and Milan by 20 minutes and between Paris and Istanbul by about two hours. The Through Train Service from Hook of Holland to Basle in connection with the evening departure from Liverpool Street has also been accelerated and will, as before the war, be called the "Rheingold" Express. The rolling stock will be specially selected for comfort and this train will reach Basle at 7.20 p.m. next day and therefore connect with a number of Swiss holiday resorts. The

quickest through connection from England to Switzerland will be provided by the 4.30 p.m. Service ex Victoria Station and reach Basle via Folkestone-Boulogne at 7.50 a.m. next day.

To Commemorate the 600th anniversary of the entry of Zurich into the Swiss Confederation, the Committee of Zurich Guilds has decided to organise a great historical procession on the 22nd April next. Consequently, the Procession arranged for the following Monday and the "Sechseläuten" Children's Procession will not take place.

The historical procession will include some 2,800 participants, practically entirely recruited from the Zurich Guilds, and will illustrate the development of Zurich during its 600 years' association with the Confederation. It will recall the Alliance of 1351 of the four original cantons, the participation of Zurich with Hans Waldmann at the Battle of Morat, the great Shooting Matches of 1504, the Reformation led by Ulrich Zwingli and the famous boat journey to Strasbourg with a pot of millet. Other groups will depict the Zurich fortifications of 1640, the perpetual alliance with France under Louis XIV, tableaux of life in, and the campaign of, the 18th century, the aid given to Berne in 1798 and finally the new Federal Constitution with two large groups of banners of the canton and the Guilds.

During the past year, 123,500 persons visited the castle of Chillon and amongst them were pupils from 338 Swiss schools and 70 foreign schools.



In the presence of notabilities of the diplomatic and cultural world, the European Cultural Centre was recently inaugurated at the Villa Mon Repos, Geneva.

Speeches were made and messages were received in the name of the European Movement and from the

College of Europe.

Mr. Albert Picot, State Councillor of Geneva, speaking of cultural exchanges between various countries, said that this task could only be realised given the respect of the human personality and the liberty of the human mind. Mr. Denis de Rougemont, the Director of the Centre, in stating the objects of this European Cultural Centre, stressed the necessity of saving European culture if Europe wishes to maintain its place in the world.

At a time when machines and industrialisation were bringing about a mad rush to speed up the tempo of life and thereby leaving man less time in which to meditate, the cinematograph was invented, for man

does not live on bread alone.

In its initial stages, the cinema was merely an attraction competing with fair grounds and the like but in the course of 50 years it has achieved an indispensable place in present day life. News reels bring current events immediately to the screen, films exactly depict the cultural life of our age and the documentary

films give the history of our times.

In the same way as we preserve books, newspapers, pictures, so must we preserve films. Most countries nowadays have their own cinematographic museum and in Switzerland the Film Archives were established in Basle in 1943. Owing to certain internal difficulties, however, this organisation had to abandon its activities and it was then that a few young dynamic cinema enthusiasts in Lausanne took action to ensure that the Basle Film Archives were transferred to Lausanne. They met with the benevolent support and welcome from competent persons and from the Lausanne authorities, and to-day the Swiss Cinematographic Museum is a reality. It comprises to-day some six thousand reels.
