## HANS BUSER †.

We deeply regret to announce the passing away of Mr. Hans Buser, of “ Weggis,” Sea Lane, Goring-by-Sea, Sussex, at the age of 79. The Cremation took place in Brighton on Wednesday last.

With Hans Buser, the Swiss Colony has lost one of its oldest members, and a true and faithful Swiss.

The deceased came to this country at the early age of twenty, and for many years was in business in Gutter Lane in the City, as London representative of the firm Buser and Keiser, Manufacturers of Ladies Underwear, in Laufenburg (Ct. Aargau). He retired from business in 1935.

In his earlier years, Hans Buser took a great interest in the life of the Swiss Colony in London. He was a member of the Swiss Mercantile Society for more than fifty years, and for many years (since 1924) belonged to the City Swiss Club.

All those who have known this kindly and congenial man, will keep him in good remembrance, and we are tendering our deepest sympathy to his widow in her sad bereavement.
