The recent great loss which the Society had sustained in the person of its President, and leader of the "Corale", cast a cloud over the proceedings.

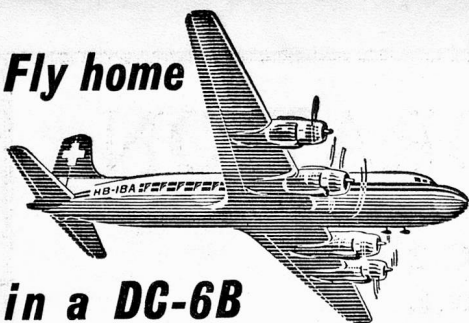
