FederalThe Federal Council has appointed
Monsieur René Naville, at present
Chargé d'Affaires at Djakarta
(Indonesia), to the post of Swiss Minister in Chile.
Monsieur Naville was born in 1905 in Cologny
(Geneva). He studied law at the Universities of
Geneva, Basle, London and Berlin, entering the
diplomatic service in 1931. Two years later he was
sent to Paris as Attaché and later on was promoted
to the rank of Secretary of Legation. From 1941-45,
he was in charge of the Swiss Consulate in Paris.
In 1945, M. Naville was made a Counsellor of-
Legation and sent to Venezuela as Chargé d'Affaires
where he remained until his return to Berne in 1949.
In 1952, he went to Djakarta.

Monsieur Eric Kessler, the new Swiss Minister, presented his letter of credence to the President O'Kelly at Arus an Uachtarain. (Eire). On his journey to and from Arus an Uachtarain

On his journey to and from Arus an Uachtarain the Swiss Minister's car was accompanied by an escort of honour, consisting of a cavalry motor cycle detachment. After he had presented his credentials, M. Kessler inspected a guard of honour drawn up outside Arus an Uachtarain.

The Minister for External Affairs, Mr. Aiken, was present at the ceremony, and the Swiss Minister was accompanied by Mr. Adolphe Gygax, Vice-Consul.

Monsieur Viktor Repic has presented his credentials as Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary of the Republic of Yugoslavia, to Monsieur R. Rubattel, President of the Swiss Confederation and Monsieur M. Petitpierre, Swiss Foreign Minister, in Berne.

The newly accredited Minister has occupied various important governmental posts, and represented his country for four year in Vienna.

Minister Dr. Jean Hotz, Director of the commercial section of the Swiss Federal Department of Economics has retired at the age of 65. Minister Hotz has taken part over a number of years in international trade talks.

During the month of December, 1953, the Swiss Federal Railways carried 16.26 million passengers, or 2.14 million less than in December, 1952. Receipts: 23.30 million francs. (Dec. 1952: 26.38 million francs).

Goods traffic increased in December, 1953, by 155,000 tons and is returned as 1.64 million tons. Receipts: 31.01 million francs. (Dec. 1952: 25.92 million francs).

of Dr. Streuli having been elected a Federal Councillor, took place on the 7th of this month.

There were three candidates in the field. Emil Reich, Director of the "Strafanstalt, Regensdorf" (democrat), received 73,447 votes, Dr. Edmund Richner, Editor, (liberal), received 35,841 votes, and Dr. Walter Seiler, (christian socialist), received 20,417 votes. Director Emil Reich, (the overall majority being 65,639), was therefore elected a member of the cantonal government.

Emil Reich was born in November 1900 in Hemberg (Toggenburg) the son of a mountain peasant. He received his education at the "Evangelischen Lehreseminar" Zurich, and after having been for 5 years occupied in his father's business, he moved to Greifensee where he was elected clerk to the rural council. In 1913, he was elected "Jugendsekretär und Amtsvormund" of the district Uster. In 1948, Emil Reich was nominated Director of the cantonal "Strafanstalt" Regensdorf. In the army he holds the rank of Colonel. [A.T.S.]

Army

The Federal Council has promoted Colonel H. Rieser to the post of Chief of the section of military aviation and

air defence. Colonel Rieser was born in 1901 in Berne, and is a citizen of Berne and Wuppenau (Thurgau). He attended schools in Berne and St. Gall and studied languages in Rome, Cambridge, London, Paris and Berlin. He then studied at the Federal Institute of Technology (ETH) Zurich, where he passed his examination as an architect. After several years in this branch, he was until the beginning of the last war for five years General Secretary of the Swiss Aero Club. During the war: Commander of various units and joined the Federal Military Department in 1942. Towards the end of the war: Commander of the Group of special squadrons for Air Defence. In 1947, he was appointed Military and Air Attaché in London, a post which he held for 5 years.

The Swiss Government intends to buy 100 more British Venon jet fighters at a cost of 115 million francs.

Pierre Court, "Staatsschreiber" of the canton of Neuchâtel since 1942, and a former Journalist and member of the Grand Council of the canton of Neuchâtel, in Neuchâtel, at the age of 51.

Louis Merlin, a former translator at the Federal Economic Department, and Editor-in-Chief of the "Journal du Jura", Bienne, in Estavayer-le-Lac, aged 74.

André Marchand, since 1942 examining judge of the "Montagnes neuchâeloises" in La Chaux de Fonds, at the age of 57.

Louis Ansermier, veteran Swiss Balloonist, who won the Gordon Bennett Aeronautic Cup in 1921, in Geneva, aged 83.

Dr. phil. Rageth Domenig-Vonzun in Zurich, at the age of 66. The deceased was a citizen of Tamins (Ct. Grisons); from 1916-1919, he was a teacher at the secondary school St. Moritz, and afterwards held the post of Editor of the "Engadiner Post", St. Moritz. From 1930-1943 he was a member of the editorial staff of the "Freien Rätiers", Chur, after which he settled down in Zurich as a free lance Journalist.

Karl Muheim, President of the Board of the "Urner Kantonalbank" in Altdorf, aged 67. The deceased was from 1919-1923 President of the commune of Altdorf, from 1920-1940 a member of the "Landrat", over which he presided in 1928/29. From 1926-1927, he was a member of the States Council, and from 1931-1947 he sat in the National Council as a Liberal. [A.T.S.].

Mme. Susanna Anna Streuli-Schmidt (90) of Wädenswil, mother of the recently elected Federal Councillor, Dr. Hans Streuli. She is the cofounder, and for many years President of the "Frauenverein Wädenswil" and head of the "Weiblichen Fortbildungsschule Wädenswil".

Dr. Heinrich Wanner (70) of Basle, formerly rector of the "Freien Evangelischen Schule" in Basle, and a prominent historian.

During 1953, 2,224 Swiss emigrated overseas. (1952: 3,626). [A.T.S.]

The first Swiss Customs launch to be equipped with radar is now patrolling Lake Geneva searching for smugglers between the French and Swiss shores.

The Swiss Confederation issued 161,219 work permits to foreigners last year, an increase of 12,471 over 1952. Building took most foreign workers, with 41,600 followed by the hotel industry with 31,000 and agriculture with 28,300.

Hugo Koblet, champion Swiss racing cyclist has been elected honorary president of Glasgow Stella Racing Club, membership of which is limited to 20.

A surprising demand was recently refused by a Berne suburban municipality. The Chinese Legation had sought permission to erect a new building for a 50-room Communist diplomatic school.

It is now stated that the school was not intended for educating and training Communist diplomatists but was to be a centre where these staffs and their dependents could be lodged. In fact, the Chinese Legation has 43 members, the Polish 29, the Czechoslovak 43, and the Russian 60, and the so-called school was intended to have been a hostel where staffs and their dependents could have lived a collective life under the care and control of special agents.

Max Angst and Jules Hug, the Swiss bobsleighers, won the St. Moritz Boblet Grand Prix. They had an aggregate time of 5min 42.4sec for four runs.

The Federal Supreme Court has made known its judgment in the case of the Zürich journalist and art critic Karl Seelig, to whom the management of a local cinema — dissatisfied with one of his articles refused admittance, even after he had paid for a seat. In his appeal he had asserted that he had a right to be admitted with his Press card, or with a free or purchased ticket, and that the cinema was under an obligation to give or sell him a ticket.

The Supreme Court rejected these claims. The Press card, it said, does not mention the right of free admittance, but merely shows that the bearer is a professional journalist who may benefit from the usual facilities, which can be suspended or cancelled. The judgment added that the liberty of the Press, as established by the constitution, only concerns the legal relations between the State and an individual. The State must refrain from preventing or hindering the Press from carrying out its mission, but it is not under an obligation to intervene actively on behalf of a journalist to safeguard his interests. The court therefore held that existing legislation makes it impossible to admit the journalist's claim, and that the only solution would be an amicable arrangement between the two parties, failing which new legislation should be introduced.

SWISSAIR EARNINGS FOR 1953 SHOW AN INCREASE OF 25%.

Swissair's earnings in 1953 soared to 86 million Swiss Francs, representing an increase of 25% over 1952. Substantial additional costs for technical materials, petrol and additions to personnel have, however, to be taken into consideration, together with expenditure for training of personnel — mainly crews — which amounted to 3.7 million Swiss Francs; more than half a million over and above that of the previous year.

Streamlining of the system of working and a better utilisation in general made it possible to reduce the costs in the offered ton-mile, although on the other hand earnings have been reduced due to the introduction of cheap Tourist Class fares.

Characteristic of Ĉivil Aviation generally considerably improved results which are reflected in our statistics against those of the previous year are undoubtedly due to the substantial increase in traffic by the introduction of the Tourist Class fares over the European network.

Whilst the offered ton-mile has been increased by as much as 45% and point to point passengers by 45%, mail by 40% and freight by 29%, this increase has been effected without any appreciable addition to the Swissair fleet.
