Theodor Scherrer, from 1938-1946, a member of the Government of the canton of Schaffhausen, and for twenty-five years a member of the Grand Council, in Neuhausen, at the age of 75.

Johann Wyss, from 1939-1954, a member of the Government of the canton of Zug, in Steinhausen, aged 67. The deceased held the post of President of the commune of Steinhausen, nr. Zug for 25 years.

William Ritter, author and painter, in Melide, at the age of 88.

Dr. Fritz Neefe, Founder and co-proprietor of the Institute Minerva, Basle, in Basle, aged 69.

NEW AIR ROUTE TO DAMASCUS.

A CITIZEN OF THE WORLD.

(We have much pleasure in re-producing below a notice which has appeared in the "Tablet", on April 2nd, 1955.)

Last week Catholic representatives, together with others from most of the relief organizations in London, gathered together at the Great Russell Street Y.M.C.A. to say an official farewell to one of the best friends that refugees can have had, if length of service be any criterion. Dr. Kullman, a Swiss citizen, though described perhaps more accurately by one of the speakers as a citizen of the world, has been working for refugees for over twenty-five years, and up till the end of last year as representative of the High Commissioner for Refugees in London. At this tea-party he was presented with a wallet by Dame May Curwen — inside was a cheque — and representatives of various groups paid tribute to him and his selfless work all through his years in London and before. His work has been of the highest professional quality, in spite of the fact that he described himself as essentially a "voluntary society man". He has none of that warm-hearted vagueness that can be the curse of this type of work, and he will be greatly missed on his retirement."
