The large lecture Hall of the Central Hall, Westminster, was full to capacity on Thursday, December 6th, when the famous Glacier-Pilot Herrmann Geiger, under the auspices of the Ski Club of Great Britain, the Anglo-Swiss Society and the City Swiss Club, showed films and pictures of his flights in the Swiss mountain regions, many of them depicting daring rescue operations.

Mr. Geiger was introduced to the audience by H.E. the Swiss Minister, and on ascending the platform received a warm reception.

During the showing of the films a running commentary was given by one of his colleagues. On the conclusion of the lecture, Mr. Geiger, and his colleague were loudly cheered. It was a most interesting and entertaining evening.
