NEWS AT RANDOM

Federal

On the occasion of the 10th Anniversary of the resumption of diplomatic relations between the Soviet

Union and Switzerland, the Soviet Foreign Minister, M. W. Molotov has sent a telegram of greetings to M. Max Petitpierre, Swiss Foreign Minister. The latter has suitably replied.

Dr. Markus Feldmann, President of the Swiss Confederation, has sent a telegram of congratulations to President Iskandar Mirza, on the occasion of his election as President of the Pakistan Republic. The Swiss Minister in Karachi, Monsieur Emil Bisang represented the Federal Council at the festivities which have been held in the capital.

At the end of 1955, 54 diplomatic representations were registered in Berne, amongst them 12 Embassies and 42 Legations, with a staff of 281 diplomats and 422 clerks. The number of Consular representatives amounted to 160.

The Federal Council has decided to issue a new loan of 338 million francs at 3 per cent for the duration of 17 years.

The former Director-General of the Swiss Customs and Excise (Oberzolldirektor), 53 years old Ernest Widmer, was found guilty of misappropriating 100,000.—frs. (£8,330) over a period of eleven years, and the forging of a post office receipt. Extenuating circumstances included the restitution of the funds by the accused and his full confession. He was sentenced to four years imprisonment. He was also sentenced to forfeit his civil rights for five years after completing his sentence.

Cantonal

The accounts of the canton of Lucerne for the year 1955, close with a credit balance of 667,012.—frs. [A.T.S.]

The Annual General Meeting of "Swissair" took place in Zurich, on Monday, March 26th. There were 644 shareholders present, representing 33,381 votes. Dr. Rudolf V. Heberlein was in the Chair. Amongst the guests who attended were: Federal-Councillors Lepori and Streuli, former Federal-Councillors: Celio and Pilet-Golaz, Dr. Iten, President of the "Eidg. Luffahrtskommission", and Dr. Burkhard, Director of the Federal Air Office.

An increase of the share capital from 14 to 42 million francs, proposed by the Board has been accepted. A dividend of 6 per cent (1954: 4%) has been declared. [A.T.S.]

A serious motor-accident occurred on the road between Frutigen and Adelboden (Ct. Berne), when a motor-car taking a bend left the road and fell into a ravine. The driver, Ernst Geissbühler (51) of Frutigen, and Fritz Röthlisberger (70) of Bévilard were killed outright, whilst three other passengers were badly hurt. [A.T.S.]

On the occasion of her 100th birthday, Mme. Marie Saillet of Moudon, was presented with the traditional arm-chair by the Government of the canton of Vaud. [A.T.S.]

Dr. h.c. Heinrich Wachter (70) of Winterthur, Director of the Electricity Power Works of the canton of Schaffhausen, and afterwards for 30 years a member of the Management of the firm "Gebrüder Volkart", Winterthur, and President of the Board of the "Schweizerischen Industriegesellschaft", Neuhausen.

The late Eduard Reber, tax collector of Payerne, has left an amount of 32,000.—frs. to various chari-




table institutions, amongst them 10,000.—frs. to the commune of Payerne for a covered market hall.

DIAMOND WEDDING ANNIVERSARIES.

Over 12 million tourists visited Switzerland last year, $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent more than in 1954.

The 11-member Swiss expedition to Lhotse (27,890ft.), near Everest, reached Namche Bazar, according to a report received. The party left Jainagar, a border town in eastern Nepal, on March 4th and reached Okhaldunga on March 13th. Some 300 porters and 21 Sherpas are accompanying the party.

According to the original plans the climbers will halt near Namche Bazar for fresh supplies before moving up to the mountain. The base camp will be established at 16,000ft., on the Khumbu glacier. The main climbing will be attempted in April.

A delegation of four British officers has arrived in Switzerland with a view to instructing Swiss troops in the use of Centurion tanks.

Swiss motorists must remove all pointed or sharp objects from their cars by June 1st, in a Swiss drive to cut down road deaths.

Pointed, edged or hooked door handles, hood handles with forward points, protective shields over headlights, and pointed luggage carriers are banned.

Swiss industry had only four strikes, involving 430 people and resulting in the loss of 1,036 working days, during 1955.

This is the lowest figure since 1927.

Isidorro Christen, the last postillion of the St. Gotthard mail coaches, which his father used to drive over the pass, has died at Bellinzona. aged 94.

Montreux International Coach Rally, 1956.

The 8th International Coach Rally will take place in Montreux from the 16th to the 19th May, 1956. The programme comprises technical tests, a 90-mile coach excursion in the mountains and a "Concours d'Elégance", as well as various social functions.


Boy Scouts Camp in Switzerland's "Wild West".

Saignelégier, Switzerland: More than 12,000 boy scouts will pitch tents at Saignelégier, in the "Franche-Comté", the well-known horse-breeding "Wild West" of Switzerland, on July 24th, till August 2nd. As early as 1938 boy scout groups were organised in all the Cantons of Switzerland, and today there are only a few villages which do not have their own small bands of boy scouts in the familiar khaki uniforms. The forest-fringed pasture land between the villages of Saignelégier and Tramelan offers a perfect background for the campers. This 5th Swiss Boy Scouts meeting is expected to stimulate a surge of tourists towards the "Franche-Comté", with many boy scouts and their parents and visitors getting acquainted with this unique region.

12th International Musical Competition in Geneva.

Following a decade-old tradition culminating in last year's festival in which 263 candidates from 22 nations took part, the International Musical Competition at Geneva in 1956 will again attract ambitious young talent from all over the world. It is scheduled to last from September 22nd to October 6th. Musical faculties to be judged include singing, piano, violin, oboe, horn and, for the first time, guitarre. The names of the judges — internationally prominent music connoisseurs — will be announced shortly.

Th econtests are organised, as in previous years, with the co-operation of Radio Geneva and the Orchestre de la Suisse Romande.
