TWO DISTINGUISHED MUSICIANS.

On Friday, March 14th, discerning music-lovers had an opportunity of hearing two of the most distinguished Swiss musicians, Henri Honegger and Frank Martin, both of Geneva, in a recital at the Wigmore Hall. Both of them are already well known in England from previous — though not joint — visits. Frank Martin is better known as a composer, of international repute, whose works have occasionally been heard in the B.B.C. service as well as at various concerts. Of course, our Madame Sophie Wyss is amongst the foremost interpreters of Frank Martin's compositions in England. On this occasion his brilliantly executed task was mainly that of accompanying Henri Honegger, the cellist. But two interesting works of Frank Martin were included in the programme: five preludes as piano solos, and a dramatically exciting piece of music for cello and piano entitled *Ballade*. This work was acclaimed both by the public and the critics as of exceptional interest, and most beautifully performed by the two artists. Henri Honegger also had his especial triumph in Bach's sixth unaccompanied cello suite which he played with complete mastery. In their ensembles the two artists showed themselves capable of achieving great heights of joint self-expression in interpreting either the classic masters or Debussy or Frank Martin himself. Our two compatriots had a good audience including quite a sprinkling of members of our Colony. On the whole they also had a good Press.

As a send-off for the two artists our Ambassador and Madame Armin Daeniker had organised on the eve of the recital an intimate house-concert at the Embassy. Amongst the necessarily limited number of guests were numerous prominent members of the musical as well as the political and diplomatic circles of London.
