“GRUEMPELSCHIESSEN” DINNER

If my memory serves me correctly, I believe the Annual Dinner of the Swiss Rifle Association, also called “Grümpelschiessen” (What a mouthful!), which took place on Friday, 20th November, at the Glendower Hotel, Glendower Place, S.W.7. — the headquarters of the Association — is about the thirty-third of its kind. (The Swiss Rifle Association was founded in 1923, but during the last war, and some time after, no annual dinners were held.) At one time the ladies were asked to this annual feast, which included dancing. In recent years, however, the ladies were “dispensed with” for a reason unknown to me.

Whilst at one time I was enrolled on the active list, attending shooting practices both at Hendon and Bisley, I cannot claim to have added much to the success of the Association. The only thing I have done — and have done well — has been to regularly partake of the sumptuous repasts placed before me. Shooting at a range is not devoid of some risks, and to avoid any possible “casualties”, I laid down my rifle and took up my pen instead. My fellow members, rightly or wrongly thought, that I would be less of a security risk as “Press Reporter”, and now for many years I have described these dinners which mark the “cease fire” on the Bisley “battleground”.

In order to kindle the right “Stimmung” cocktails were served, until it was announced that dinner was served. On the way to the dining room an opportunity presented itself to have a look at the “Gabentisch”, which contained an amazing variety of goods and cash prizes.

The dining room presented an animated picture. Behind the presidential chair the fine banner of the Association was placed. The top table was embellished with innumerable silver cups and other trophies which had been won in many hard fought competitions.

Once again the *Chef* of the Glendower Hotel is entitled to put a feather in his cap for the excellent dinner he had prepared, which came, as usual, fully up to expectations.

Towards the end of the dinner the Toasts to H.M. the Queen and Switzerland were proposed by the President and duly honoured.

The speeches which followed were — as usual on these occasions — short and to the point. Mr. J. C. Wetter extended a hearty welcome to the company, and especially to H.E. the Swiss Ambassador, Monsieur Beat de Fischer, Honorary President of the S.R.A., who for the

first time was attending one of the gatherings of the Association, voicing also the gratitude on behalf of the members for the support the Embassy has continually given to the Society. He expressed the hope that His Excellency would one day come to Bisley to see the riflemen “at work”. (*Applause*). The President then greeted the official guests, Colonel Werner Koch, Military and Air Attaché at the Embassy, a representative of the Surrey Rifle Association, Dr. H. Rast (personal guest of the President), and Mr. A. Stauffer, Press Reporter, and former editor of the “Swiss Observer”. (From the Embassy were also present Messieurs Ansermoz, Tosio, Burgunder, Brunner and Diessler.) Mr. Wetter then read a telegram of good wishes from Monsieur Armin Daeniker, former Swiss Ambassador in London. The loud applause which this announcement evoked testified how much this *beau geste* was appreciated. He also mentioned that he had, whilst in Switzerland, an opportunity to meet Colonel Gygli, at one time Military and Air Attaché at the then Swiss Legation in London, and now Chief of the General Staff of the Swiss Army, an old friend of the Swiss Rifle Association, who wished to be remembered to the Association’s members.

The President conveyed his and the members’ heartiest congratulations to the veteran member Mr. Peter Odermatt, who had recently celebrated his golden wedding anniversary. He mentioned that at the last General Meeting, Mr. Alfred Schmid, for fifteen years President of the S.R.A. had been elected Honorary Past-President with a seat on the committee. He paid a sincere tribute to Mr. Peter Fischer, Vice-President, who shot at Bisley a maximum sixty points (six tens), which he termed a “rare and splendid result”. Mr. Wetter thanked the range officers for the good services they had rendered, and especially Mr. F. Magnin, Honorary Secretary, for his always painstaking, efficient and devoted work. In conclusion he expressed to the family Schmid his appreciation for the generous hospitality the S.R.A. always enjoys at the Glendower Hotel. The President’s short address was greeted with much applause.

The next speaker was H.E. the Swiss Ambassador, Monsieur Beat de Fischer, who on rising received a great ovation. He thanked the members for the cordial welcome, which had just been accorded to him on his first visit to the Swiss Rifle Association, and for having elected him Honorary President of the Association, an honour, which he said, he greatly appreciated. He mentioned, that he considered the S.R.A. one of the most sensible organisations of the Colony, and a high symbol of our army. He spoke of the problems the Swiss Army is at present confronted with, and of the importance of self-discipline “to reach the target” in all undertakings. The Ambassador briefly touched on the actual differences with the E.F.T.A., and in conclusion wished the Association every success for the future. Monsieur de Fischer’s interesting oration was loudly cheered by the entire company.

The Ambassador was then asked to present the following silver cups: the *Minister C. R. Paravicini’s Challenge Cup* to Mr. Marcel Bucherer, the *Ambassador Armin Daeniker’s Senior Cup* to Mr. J. C. Wetter, the *Major Talbot-Smith Presentation Cup* to Mr. J. C. Wetter.

The distribution of the prizes followed under the able direction of Mr. F. Magnin, Honorary Secretary, amidst great excitement. The top prizes, announced with almost monotonous regularity, went this year again to Messrs. Peter Fischer and Marcel Bucherer. Various members received medals and gifts, and presentations were made to non-shooting members. (Continued on page 51302.)

This concluded a most enjoyable evening in the pleasant company of our friends of the shooting fraternity, an evening of good comradeship and good cheer, and everyone left the hospitable Glendower Hotel loaded with cups, bottles and prizes and happy memories.
