ALBERT GALLUSSER †

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Albert Gallusser of 53, rue Boissière, Paris. He died on 2nd August at the age of 86.

Albert Gallusser was born in 1879, and originates from Berneck (St. Gall).

After studying in Romanshorn, Basle and Geneva, he went to Paris, and a few years later was sent to China where he lived for several years.

Later on, in 1910, he created his own merchant firm in Tientsin, which became a branch of the Société du Pacifique.

After some years spent in travelling, he interested himself in a Reptile skins tannery in France, subsequently sold to a competitor; then in brick manufacturing at Uxbridge, utilising a Swiss process. That business was stopped by the war.

In summer 1941, he was sent to French Equatorial Africa to try and organise the purchase of timber, one of the major exports; but his journey by boat took nearly four months, during which time Britain contracted with the Free French for the total purchase of all their produce, and nominated specific local firms to handle the business. His mission arrived too late.

Nevertheless, on his return, he joined the Rourafic group as agent, later as one of the directors. He resigned in 1949 and from that date acted as Colonial adviser to a number of firms, British and foreign, an activity which took him amongst others for several months to India, to try out a number of French agricultural tractors on uncultivated land in the Punjab; and also for several periods to Berlin. Early in 1964, he moved to Paris.

We extend our deep sympathy to his widow and daughter in Paris and his son in Argentina.
