NEWS FROM THE COLONY

UNITED SERVICE

11th December 1966

*To be What He wants me to be
To go where He wants me to go
To do what He wants me to do.*

More and more, the United Service which the Swiss Church holds once every year with the Anglican congregation of St. Mary Woolnoth, is becoming a joyful event to which both the Swiss and the English look forward to. This Service is almost looked upon as the first of the Christmas celebrations, which is also outwardly expressed by the traditional Advent wreath with its three candles alight for the third Sunday in Advent. The refreshments, too, with which the churchgoers were regaled after the Service had Christmas character.

The liturgy was shared by the Rev. Bill Allam and Pfr. Marcel Dietler; the sermon was preached by His Worship, the Mayor of Merton, Sir Cyril Black, J.P., D.L., M.P., who is known to many Swiss who attended the First of August Celebration at Wimbledon Town Hall. With Sir Cyril Black, a Baptist voice has been heard so that it can be rightly said the Anglican, the Baptist and the Reformed children of the reformation have met at a family reunion. Among those present we noticed the Lord Mayor of London, Sir Robert Bellinger, who took part in the Service quite informally as an ordinary member of the congregation. Present were also Lady Black who had accompanied her husband and Madame de Fischer.

Sir Cyril Black's sermon was based upon Acts 11,26 where we hear that the disciples were first called Christians in Antioch. The contents of the sermon can be summarized as an answer to the question: "What does it mean to be a Christian?" As a first point the Mayor brought home to us the Words: "To be what He wants me to be" which the hearer could apply to his own denomination or also to his position in life. As a second point he stressed: "To go where He wants me to go"; here we might think among other things of those who knowingly or unknowingly would be with us for the last time in this particular Service. Thirdly we were admonished: "To do what He wants me to do". I believe it is more than a mere coincidence that while our guest preacher coined these words, outside the church, newspapers were obtainable in which the news could be read that the Mayor as a Member of Parliament had succeeded in being instrumental to having the further sale of another specially objectionable book stopped. Thus in our Service Word and Action proved to be one.
