IT HAPPENED IN THE CANTONS OF ZUG AND GLARUS

ZUG

At the end of November, elections took place in the Canton of Zug. Dr. Augustin Lusser (Conservative Christian Socialist) was re-elected, and Landammann Dr. Hans Huerlimann (same Party) was elected as Councillor of States for Zug. All seven members of the Cantonal Government were confirmed in office. The distribution in the Cantonal Parliament is as follows: Conservative Christian Socialists: 44 (1 gain), Liberals: 23 (3 losses), Social Democrats: 10 (2 gains), and "Landesring der Unabhängigen" same as hitherto (1). 107 candidates had contested the 78 seats. The new President of the Cantonal Council is the former Vice-President Konrad Hess (Conservative) from Zug. The Alterspräsident chairing the first meeting, had to give the casting vote for the new Vice-President; Stadtrat August Sidler was elected. The new Landammann is the present Statthalter Silvan Nussbaumer, a Swiss who was born in U.S.A. and had returned to his Canton in 1937.

The budget for 1967 estimates a small surplus; revenue expected to amount to 43m. francs in the ordinary accounts, Road construction, schools and large sums needed for waste-water plants will amount to nearly 20m. france, and the loss in the extraordinary accounts is expected to be 7m. francs. Construction of the proposed new building for the Cantonal School is the "Luegeten" in Northern Zug, will require nearly 30m. Swiss francs. For the first time since the "Zugerland Verkehrsbetriebe" began to run buses instead of trams, a deficit resulted in 1964. Together with the loss in 1965, Fr.618,000 are now missing to cover costs. The Canton proposes to carry the accumulated deficit.

With the ceremonious enthronement of the "Räbenvater", the traditional carnival of **Baar** was opened the first week-end in January. A week later, there was an international meeting of masked participants. **Menzingen** now has a new high school with gymnasium.

With an increase of motor vehicles of 10% in one year in the town of **Zug**, accidents have remained slightly under last year's figures, and thus a sizable decrease may be claimed. An old well already mentioned in the "Stumpf Chronik" of 1548, was discovered by workmen in the old town of Zug. Last September, the "beat fan groups" of Zug asked the town authorities for a hall for their meetings. At the suggestions of a policeman, the authorities have agreed and asked that the young repair the path in the Friedbachtobel by way of payment. The agreement is being adhered to scrupulously by both parties.

GLARUS

Revenue in the Canton of Glarus is estimated at $30\frac{1}{2}$ m. and expenditure at $31\frac{1}{4}$ m. francs for 1967. A five-year plan is to be worked out regarding income and expenditure, on which the new tax law will be based. At the coming *Landsgemeinde*, a newly and totally revised tax Bill is to be put forward. The present collection of cantonal laws dates back to 1923 with an additional volume in 1937. Lawyers are studying a new edition which is to be ready by 1970.

Another proposal to be put forward to the *Lands-gemeinde* in spring suggests the vote for women in church and welfare matters.

The "Evangelische Gemeinschaft" has celebrated its centenary. The first mechanical/biological waste-water plant of the Canton and of the Walensee region has become operational at Muehlehorn. The silver-grey carriages of the Braunwald railway (*Standseillbahn*) have been exchanged for red ones (capacity 100 as against 60)

The arsenal in Glarus has been renovated and its completion facilitates rationalisation.
