FRANK DELALOYE 80

It is with great pleasure that we announce the 80th birthday on 26th April of Mr. Frank Delaloye, of 15 Bartholomew Villas, N.W.5. His biographical notes went astray in the post, which delayed this write-up.

Mr. Delaloye hails from Ardon in the Valais where he was brought up by his widowed mother. In 1905, after having served as a pageboy at the Hotel d'Orient at Menton in France, he came to this country and established himself quickly at the Trocadero in London. Fernand, as he was originally called, went through the various sections of the Troc and in turn became vegetable cook, *commis*, headwaiter, chef, superintendent.

In 1915, Mr. Delaloye became Assistant Manager of the Regent Palace Hotel and Manager a year later. In 1926, he returned to the Troc as its Manager. He made a great success of his work there at a period when the Trocadero was at the height of its fame.

After a quarter of a century, in that position, Mr. Delaloye became Manager of the Throgmorton Restaurant, an equally important but less arduous job. He retired a few years ago, still full of zest and good humour and with a great love of sport, especially soccer.

Frank Delaloye has always taken a keen interest in the Swiss community. He was an Honorary Member of the Union Helvetia, is a Trustee of the Société de Secours Mutuels and an Honorary Member of the Swiss Club (Schweizerbund).

His many friends join his family in wishing him many more years of good health and happiness, and may he never lose his vitality and stimulating sense of fun. MM

We regret to announce the death of Madame Meylan who died at Clarens at the age of 83. Some of our readers will remember her as *Secrétaire Sociale* at the "Foyer Suisse" in London until the outbreak of the war.

We announce with deep regret the death of Mr. Alfred Maeder. He died in Lausanne at the age of 73. He lived in London for many years and was Chief Inspector at the Ionian Bank and General Manager for Egypt.

From the obituary column of "The Times" we have learnt of the death of Mayor Eric Miville at the age of 67. As a young man, he joined the Swiss Cavalry and was a member of the Swiss Army Jumping Team which won the international competition for the Aga Khan Cup at the Dublin Horse Show three times in the first five years and became the first outright winner of this trophy. In the Russo-Finnish War he served with the Finnish Army, and in the second world war he followed an appeal by General de Gaulle and joined the French Foreign Legion. Later, he settled in Ireland where he became a well-known horse breeder. He was director of the stud at Moyglare, Maynooth in County Kildare, for the Swiss industrialist Mr. W. Haefner.
