A CORRECTION

In our issue of 12th January, we published a news item regarding the first translation into English of a work by Charles F. Ramuz. We have been informed that this is not correct. In 1922, “The Reign of the Evil one” (“Règne de l'Esprit malin”) was published in New York, and “The Soldier's Tale” in 1924 by Chester in London, followed by “Beauty on Earth” in London and New York. “The End of All Men” appeared in 1944 in New York, and “Triumph of Death” (“Présence de la Mort”) in 1946 by Routledge, London. “When the Mountain fell” appeared in New York as the translation of “Derborence”. “The Terror on the Mountain” which we announced as translation of “La Grande Peur dans la Montagne” is therefore not the first Ramuz work to be published in English, but the first translation of this particular title.

BRITISH BROWN BOVERI

In the Spring of 1967, Brown Boveri & Co. Ltd. and the Oerlikon Engineering Company (also known under the names of Maschinenfabrik Oerlikon AG, and Ateliers de Construction Oerlikon) merged their interests in Switzerland. As a consequence of this the responsibility for the sale and maintenance of equipment in the U.K. made by the Oerlikon Engineering Company is now transferred from Oerlikon Limited (shortly to be wound up) to British Brown-Boveri Limited, Glen House, Stag Place, London S.W.1.
