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Hürlimann holds furthermore the license of a well known pub down in Kent called the "Grasshopper". Needless to say, the firm also sells in the Swiss Centre. At the same time last year, Hürlimann organised a tennis tournament in Brighton in which many world-renowned champions took part. This event, Mr. Platss explained to me, cost a lot of money and was commercially futile. If a beer company wishes to sponsor a sporting event, he maintained, the only field in which it should do so must be golfing and yachting. Golf and boating clubs are indeed great beer consumers and tennis clubs apparently not. A director of Shorts Ltd. present at this Bierkeller 1st August "do" found that there was an interesting trend towards increased consumption of lager and blonde beer in Great Britain. He went so far as to predict the death of the traditional British brown beers and ales in the coming decades. The British beer, he believes, is no longer as well-produced

as it used to be and deteriorates in transport and storing. It is also becoming more diluted all the time so the alcoholic content of lagers is markedly higher.

One of the largest brewers in this country, Allied Breweries, which leases thousands of inns, have begun to sell draught lager, which is an innovation. But as they are the producers of *Skol*, their pubs are out of bounds for Hürlimann beer.

Hürlimann is bottled and kegged at the Shephard Neames breweries in Faversham. By a reciprocal arrangement, Shephard Neame's production is marketed in Switzerland by Hürlimann. This newly arisen beer boom is a very favourable aspect of Anglo-Swiss trading relations. Bierkellers are springing up in London and elsewhere, and in Geneva, a typically English pub has been opened recently and it has thrived from the very first day.
