SWISS TOURISM ABROAD IN 1976

Holidays taken by Swiss abroad increased again in 1976. After the growth of about 3.5 per cent in 1974 and 3 per cent in 1975, the number of overnight reservations abroad by Swiss tourists increased in 1976 by 4 per cent compared with the previous year.

The rate of Swiss visits in countries that keep statistics of overnight reservations grew by 1.5 per cent, while countries that only record frontier passages showed an increase of about 20 per cent.

Making allowances for the incompleteness of certain statistics, the number of overnight stays by Swiss abroad is estimated to have totalled somewhere in the neighbourhood of 28 million, i.e. roughly a million more than in 1975. Nine-tenths of the Swiss who travel abroad remained in Europe, while 3 per cent visited North America, Africa and Asia and 1 per cent other continents.

ST. MORITZ OPENS COUNTRY'S BIGGEST YOUTH HOSTEL

Switzerland's biggest and most up-to-date youth hostel opened in St. Moritz at the beginning of December. The sleeping arrangements consist mainly of four-bedded rooms with shower facilities. Also available for the young guests will be dining room and study rooms, games room, kiosk, etc. Behind the building a big grass area stretches to the edge of the woods.

SPIKED TYRES IN SWITZERLAND

Spiked tyres may again be used this winter until 31st March. The speed limit is 80 km/h (50 m.p.h.), and cars must show a circular plate marked "80" at the rear. Driving on motorways ("National-strassen") and carriageways ("Autostrassen") is prohibited with the exception of the N. 13 motorway between Thusis and Mesocco.
