The effect of the Easter-message is a gentle process which gradually grows. A good life doesn't happen overnight.

It is just like spring not bursting upon us suddenly but in a slow and gentle process which finally produces blossoms.

The message that life conquers death has given many human beings the strength to hold on, to try again and realise that life after all makes sense. Faith that life is stronger than death builds the community. The conviction that life is full of sense unites us with our fellow Swiss and also with the people of this country whose guests we are. Quality of life is something that concerns all of us. We must all play our part to achieve this. While everywhere the question of sources of energy is debated, the Easter-message tells of a breakthrough that does not depend on outward resources. Here lies its strength.

My Easter wish to all readers of the *Swiss Observer* is that, wherever they may be this Easter-tide, they experience a new beginning which will grow and bring them joy and hope. In this sense: Happy Easter.
