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# **OBITUARIES**

**Fernand DELALOYE** was born 26th April, 1887 in Ardon/VS and came to England in 1903. He started as a page-boy and worked his way up, learning all the details of the catering trade. His first senior position was as manager of the Regent Palace Hotel in Piccadilly in the early twenties. Subsequently he managed the Trocadero Restaurant from 1926–1950. The last eight years of his working life he was manager of Lyons Throgmorton Restaurant in the City, retiring at the age of 70.

He was one time President of the Swiss Club and a member for many years. He was also a trustee of the former "Secours Mutuels des Suisses a Londres".

He had a keen interest in sports and supported Chelsea Football Club since its foundation days. He also enjoyed a good game of "Jass".

The last two years of his life were spent at Twyford Abbey Nursing Home where he died on 7th March, shortly before his 92nd birthday. We would like to extend our deep sympathy to the family of Mr. Fernand Delaloye and his friends in the Swiss community.

### **MRS. JOSEPHINE GYSIN**

It is with deep regret that we announce the death of *Mrs. Josephine Gysin, née* Anderson. She died at Potters Bar Hospital on 23rd March.

She was born in a small town called Keith in north-east Scotland, on 14th August, 1894. As a young woman she came to London to take singing lessons. It was during the first world war that she met Charles Gysin, who hailed from Geneva and had come to London early in 1914. They got married in 1918. Josephine did not carry on with her singing and piano playing to any extent, although music remained one of her favourite ways of relaxation to the end of her days.

Josephine and Charles Gysin had two sons, Charles and Francis, four grandsons and one granddaughter. On 30th June, 1957, Charles Gysin died. At that time, he was President of the City Swiss Club and he was also President of the Consistoire of the Swiss Protestant Church in London. He had spent a lifetime in the grain and seed trade and was a Director of what is now known as European Grain and Shipping Company.

In 1940, Josephine Gysin was stricken with a very severe form of arthritis, and for several years she was unable to get about unaided. She did, however, overcome the disability with great courage, and after her husband's death she lived by herself until she was taken to hospital after a stroke last November. There she died peacefully in her 85th year.

All who had the privilege of knowing her are the poorer for her passing. We shall remember with affection her kindness, her resoluteness and her Scottish humour. At the time of their marriage, she had to give up her British passport — there was no dual nationality then — and she never bothered to re-apply for British papers. She was both staunchly pro-British and pro-Swiss right to the end.

Josephine and Charles Gysin will be remembered by many, and deepest sympathy goes out to their family in their sad loss.
