CITY SWISS CLUB UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT

The Annual General Meeting of the City Swiss Club, held on 24th April as usual at the Dorchester Hotel following dinner, elected Mr. H. Jauslin of the Swiss Bank Corporation as President and Mr. Ch. Roth as Vice-President for the current year. Mr. Jauslin has in fact carried the burden of the Club's management already practically the whole of the previous year in his capacity as vice-president, as his predecessor, Mr. J. Seiffert, emigrated to New Zealand last summer at rather short notice. The May meeting, devoted to cards, was the last Mr. Seiffert presided, his departure being much regretted by his Committee and the Club at large.

Thus the change of presidency, nominally only now affected, changes little in fact, as the Annual Report presented by Mr. Jauslin to the A.G.M. covered a period actually already under his care. His skillful coping with the unexpected situation in place of Mr. Seiffert was duly acknowledged by Minister Dr. Fritschi, representing the Ambassador unavoidably unable to attend the meeting.

The Club's delightful Summer Dance at the Compleat Angler was, as Mr. Jauslin recorded in his Report, patronised by 125 members and guests. Two further card-meetings, in September and the following January were again held in the homely atmosphere of the St. Moritz Club. At the October meeting a guest speaker from the biscuit industry gave a most interesting talk.

The 113th Annual Banquet and Ball, as always the highlight of social events in the Colony, held in November, was attended by 195 members and guests with the New Zealand High Commissioner, Sir Douglas Carter, K.C.M.G., as guest of honour. The Tombola, requiring as usual much organisational effort, brought in well over £1,250 for distribution to Swiss charities, all five of which received again £250 each.

The Christmas Dinner, attended by 84 members and guests, was as in several previous years entertained by the Choir of St. Bride's Church. In February the Club enjoyed a special Swiss buffet prepared by the Dorchester's Head Chef, Mr. A. Mosimann, who also arranged a guided inspection of the hotel kitchens. At the March meeting a stimulating talk on the uses and abuses of computers was given by a director of the largest British firm in this field, Mr. A. L. C. Humphries, C.B.E.

The continuing problem of attracting better attendances at the Club's meetings from amongst still over 200 members was again discussed at the A.G.M. as so often before. The cost is no doubt a factor, especially for younger members. It was suggested by some speakers that Swiss firms might consider assisting them in this respect. To facilitate better contact between members Father Bossard volunteered making a new members' list available and reporting on the Club's activities in the *Swiss Observer*. The Club's income exceeded outgoings last year by £237. The subscription remains unchanged at £5.
