OPERA Factory Zurich pays its first visit to Britain this month to present its highly acclaimed production of "Acis and Galatea".

The Handel pastoral has an English libretto by John Gay and will be presented at the Riverside Studios, Hammer-smith, on August 13, 15, 16 and 17.

Opera Factory was formed by actor/singer/director David Freeman in Sydney in 1973 and subsequently transferred to Zurich in collaboration with Zurich-residing conductor/violinist Brenton Langbein.

The company aims to bring opera to a wider public and help to establish young singers in the formative stages of their careers.

Operas are presented in simple and inexpensive stagings, using a minimum of scenery and using improvisation and mime to elucidate and deepen the narrative.

"Acis and Galatea" combines elements of the stylised shepherd play with commedia dell'arte methods of improvisation and subtle realism.

this month is Stravinsky's "The Soldier's Tale" with libretto by renowned Swiss writer Charles-Ferdinand Ramuz.

The origins of the work, which is narrated, acted and danced, lie in Stravinsky's enforced stay in Switzerland during the First World War.

Based on a folk tale, it tells of a young soldier and his violin

which is coveted by the devil.

The Michael Kustow production is being staged at the Queen Elizabeth Hall, London, on August 15, 16 and 17.

Incidentally the sets and costumes for the first performance of the piece were designed by Swiss painter Rene Auberjonois, father of journalist Ferdinand Auberjonois, a

prominent member of the Swiss community in London.

Swiss ballerina Manola Asensio makes a welcome return to London this month too.

Fresh from her recent tour of the Soviet Union, she will perform leading roles in the London Festival Ballet's season at the Royal Festival Hall (August 12 to September 4).
