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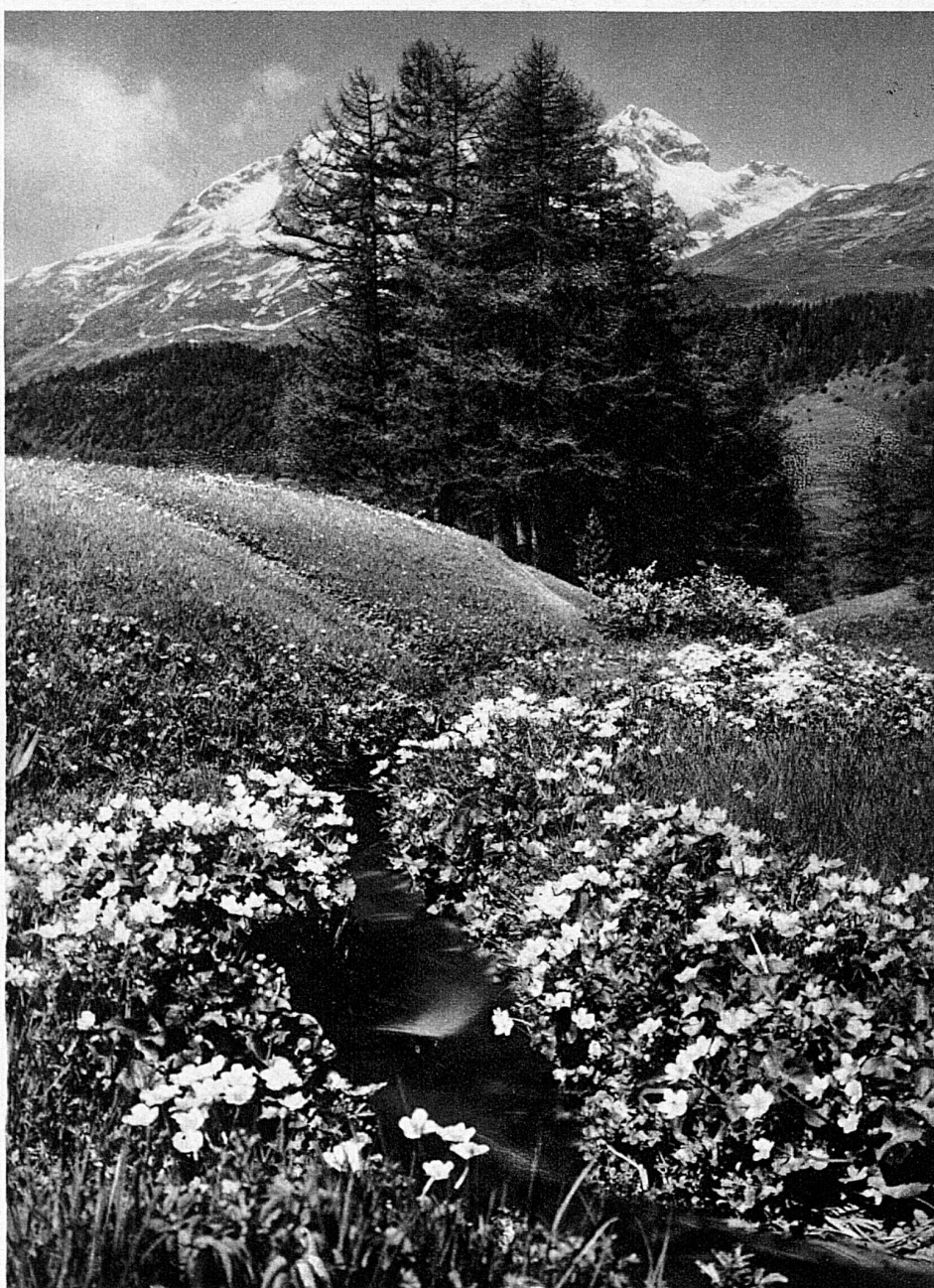
WILD-FLOWER TIME IN SWITZERLAND

Many people have heard much of the coveted edelweiss with its velvet-like petals and its habit of growing in dangerous places, and they know of the popular alpenrose and some of the other rarer Alpine specimens. Many of us have seen them as emblems, carved in wood and ivory, when we have never seen the real flower.
