I was staying in Erstfeld in September 2001 and was intrigued by a local initiative that took place on Wednesday 12th September.

After about 07.30 increasing numbers of school children appeared in the streets, some pulling empty two-wheeled hand carts. Half an hour later they started to reappear from all directions, the handcarts now loaded with bundled newspapers. In the station goods yard five open wagons had been positioned and the children, with adult supervision, started loading the newspapers into the wagons. There was only one conveyor belt available so much of the work was done manually, chain gang style.

I left Erstfeld at 08.30 and returned about 14.00 to find four of the five wagons already well filled but loading was still going on and the children certainly appeared to be enjoying themselves. When I returned again in the evening four wagons had been sheeted over and they had been moved down the yard a little way to free the turning area used by the Erstfeld - Flüelen bus.

Apparently this operation takes place twice a year when the children collect bundled newspapers from all over the village for onward transport by rail. The phrase "work experience" obviously has a more realistic meaning to the Swiss and I did ponder on just how much "red tape" would have to be cut to allow a similar exercise to take place in the UK. Four wagons full at least would be my guess!
